We are delighted that renowned illustrator and academic, Andrew Baker, has started tutoring at Leith School of Art. Andrew is teaching the Foundation Course alongside Leesa French, David Martin and Jenny Martin. A very warm welcome to Andrew, his observant, kind and gentle personality, and the huge wealth of knowledge and passion he brings to the School.

Andrew has moved to Leith with his wife Linda, who is also an artist. They have two boys, Ray and James. He joins us after years of teaching as Senior Lecturer in Illustration at Middlesex University. At Duncan of Jordanstone, Andrew worked as an external assessor. Originally from Ripon, North Yorkshire, he studied at Liverpool Polytechnic and the Royal College of Art. In a poetic co-incidence, he attended the same secondary school as one of Leith's Founders, Lottie Cheverton.

Andrew's work has been shown in the Design, New Media, Book and Editorial sections of Images: The Best of British Illustration annually for the past 11 years. His clients include respected publications and universities such as The Guardian and the New York Times, and household names such as Barclays Bank, Diageo, Dorling Kindersley, and Lloyds. Andrew enjoys curating group exhibitions and once brought together 40 artists for Paper Galaxy's 'Happy Birthday Edward Lear'. Another noteworthy achievement of his is the collaboration with author Steve Parker and wife, Linda, titled: Body: A Graphic Guide to Us. Published by Aurum in 7 languages, this is a charming 225 page visual guide to the human body.

150 YEARS OLD

Our North Junction Street Campus is housed in the oldest Norwegian Church outside of Norway, at 150 years of age. To celebrate this rich history and our Norwegian connections, the Helping Hand Trust kindly arranged and sponsored a weekend of cultural events from the 31st of August to the 2nd of September. Activities spanned art, cuisine, music, history, linguistics and religion.

Launching the weekend, Rev. Torbjørn Holt, used the same hymns and readings as the very first service given at the Church's opening in 1868. How wonderful to have such an evocation of the maiden voyage of our cherished building! The legacy of which, left by founder Johan Storjohann and supporting ship-owners Christian Salvesen and John Warrack, remains with us to this day. £627 was donated towards repairing the ancient stonework at the front of the building.

Art played an important role in the proceedings. We were lucky enough to have an exhibition of work by tutor Matthew Storstein alongside that of his late Norwegian grandfather and famed artist, Aage Storstein. Ben Macpherson MSP unveiled an impressive 150th year commemorative sculpture by Kristina Chan, graduate of Leith School of Art, which can be seen in the front garden of the building. Commissioned by the Helping Hand Trust, this has led to another major commission for Kristina to produce an artwork for a High School back in Norway. Kristina was recently awarded a special visa to stay in the UK, given to very few people in recognition of their outstanding talent.

Fusing Scottish and Norwegian cultures through food, language and music happened in enjoyable and sometimes surprising ways. We had Norwegianstyle haggis and Cullen skink and an exploration of the links between our two languages by Dr. Alasdair Allan MSP. We also had some Norwegian and Celtic folk singing, and a rendition of Amazing Grace played on the garden hosel

Culminating the anniversary weekend, St. Mary's Cathedral held a special Sunday service. Thank you to all who were involved in this weekend, and for strengthening the School's valued links with the Norwegian Community.

Welcome Graduates

Rosa Zaira Quadrelli

Recent graduate of Fine Art Painting and Printmaking at Glasgow School of Art, Rosa's 'Theatre of Memories' is an impressive indication of her talent. Using a collection of puppets and dolls as life models which represent people, ideas or emotions, Rosa draws, paints, photographs, films, sculpts and prints to theatrically portray memories, depict relationships, and convey her feelings.

At Leith, Rosa is beginning a new narrative about a fictional isolated community with strange beliefs and customs. She has won a multitude of awards, including the Richard Ford Award, which enabled her to study in Madrid, and The Glasgow Print Studio Prize. The Spanish influence manifests itself in her focus on Charles II as one of the characters in the Theatre of Memories. Carlos Herraiz

Having completed the Foundation and Painting Courses at Leith School of Art, followed by a year at Glasgow School of Art and then two years at The Barcelona Academy of Art, Carlos has a strong foundation on which to develop his artistic ability. In addition to his studies, Carlos has work experience ranging from teaching art and working in art therapy to working as a graphic designer and technician.

Carlos' work revolves around human conditions such as solitude, isolation and oblivion. Through his work, his value of imagination and emotional connection to art is clear. Carlos aims to produce an ambitious body of work during his residency, exploring the tension between one state and another, and how after an event, a trace remains of that which has become absent.

Frith Angell

From her two years on the Painting course at Leith School of Art, Frith has shown an exceptional talent and the exquisite passion needed to become a unique and recognised painter. With the inner knowing that she will become an artist, Frith dedicated her childhood to art, spending most of her time drawing as she did not go to a school. She appreciates the freedom at Leith to learn from tutors and other students, and to take part in the Edinburgh art community, especially visiting galleries to see original paintings. Frith often

uses her own image in the mirror as a study, or objects she finds around her, focussing on them to enter her unselfconscious flow of painting.

In 2017 she was shortlisted for the Ruth Borchard self-portrait prize, and exhibited in London. Influenced and inspired by artists like Titian and Rembrandt, Frith aspires to the Royal Academy of Art and aims to create works of true depth and life.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW EMMA BOYD

Emma Boyd studied on Leith School of Art's Foundation Course in 2004-05, then specialised in Painting at the Edinburgh College of Art. Her artistic talent is clear; she was selling work in the UK and Europe after graduating. However, she discovered her calling as an art teacher and decided to focus on teaching, becoming an Art Teacher at Craigroyston Community High School. This year, Emma moved to The Royal High School, Edinburgh.

Recognising Emma's potential as a young artist, the School offered her a place despite her financial uncertainty. With funds raised from Patrons, Friends and grant makers, we were able to offer her an Assisted Place, while she covered her living expenses working in part-time jobs.

This was life-changing for Emma as it meant she could carry on to study art at university; "Without the Assisted Place, I would have been unable to attend the School. I may have been able to piece together a folio through evening classes, but without an immersive environment to really find myself and my style, I doubt I would have been able to follow an artistic career."

Emma explains how her time at Leith influenced her: "Leith School of Art gave me lifelong friends, the technical knowledge, essential skills and experience to advance my career as an artist, and the confidence to believe in myself both artistically and professionally. I found the school to be a very loving and supportive environment

which is essential to any fragile budding artist!

The tutors are all working artists with a real love of their discipline which becomes infectious."

Emma has shown herself to continually go above and beyond the call of duty, showing a genuine care for her pupils and their futures. This care, her continued warm relationship with the School, and her passion for widening participation to the arts came together in 2013. Emma suggested a partnership between Leith School of Art and Craigroyston Community High School, to offer her pupils similar opportunities to those which she had appreciated so much in her own life. Together, we launched the Schools Outreach Project, offering free, weekly, extra-curricular, high-quality art tuition to enable disadvantaged young people to deepen their artistic explorations and passions, and to have space and encouragement to pursue an artistic career. Two exceptionally talented students moved on from the Schools Outreach Project to our Foundation Course, then on to the second year undergraduate art degree. We are now trialling a multi-partnership Schools Outreach Project and are pleased to welcome pupils from The Royal High School, Holy Rood High School and Leith Academy.

Emma's story is just one of many successes coming from Leith's unique environment. She says, "In my working life, I continually fall back on the School's teachings." Thank you to the whole community for being part of making this possible, and to Emma for being a shining beacon of what can be achieved with passion and determination.
